## WELCOME

ASC President, Gary Gibson, and the ASC Local Organising Committee look forward to welcoming you to Melbourne, Victoria, Australia to attend the 2016 11<sup>th</sup> Asian Seismological Commission General Assembly. The conference will be held at the state of the art Melbourne Convention & Exhibition Centre over three full days, concluding with a gala conference dinner on the Sunday evening.

The main three day scientific program and meetings of the ASC bureau and working groups, will be held between 25-27 November commencing at 8am on the Friday. A workshop on Seismological Contributions to Earthquake Risk Mitigation, and a meeting of Australian seismologists will be held on November 24.

All full ASC2016 registrations include the welcome reception on Friday and our conference dinner on the Sunday evening.

For delegates who would like to extend their stay, we offer a choice of two 2-day post-conference tours to explore either the recent earthquake faulting and geologically recent volcanoes west of Melbourne, or the earthquake prone region east of Melbourne. Such tours are ideal for developing your seismological network. Both tours return to Melbourne by 5pm on 29 November, and most flights leaving for Asia depart in the evening so accommodation for that night may not be needed depending on your flight time.

The Australian Earthquake Engineering Conference is being held concurrently with the ASC conference and ASC delegates are welcome to attend AEES sessions of their choice by selecting this option on the registration form. ASC delegates are also welcome to attend the AEES conference dinner on the Saturday evening at Crown Casino.

## PROGRAM

We have received over 100 abstracts for the ASC and the seismological aspects of the concurrent AEES conference. The preliminary program on the next page shows the main sessions for the three days. These papers include topics within the two workshop sessions on earthquake geology and on magnitude scales.

Amongst our confirmed speakers we will have presentations by **Kenji Satake**, Professor-Earthquake Research Institute, The University of Tokyo, Japan; **Brian Kennett**, Emeritus Professor of Seismology-Research School of Earth Sciences, The Australian National University; **Toshiaki Yokoi**, Director of IISEE, Tsukuba, Japan, and **Paul Somerville**, Chief Geoscientist-Risk Frontiers, NSW, Australia.

**Posters** - The conference venue has a large open space overlooking the city which will be used for posters, exhibitions and catering. An oral paper provides a captive audience for a limited time, with limited opportunity for discussions or questions, while a poster presentation allows plenty of time for discussion with individuals or small groups during tea breaks and lunch. If you are presenting on oral paper and wish to include a poster on the topic, please advise the committee before October 25.

If you have not submitted an abstract for an oral presentation but would like to give a poster presentation, or you have an oral paper but also have another topic suitable for a poster, please submit an abstract for a poster. Although most of the oral sessions are now full, it is possible that some time slots may become available for poster presenters.

**Publication** - All abstracts will be listed in the program guide. A USB will be provided on registration that includes all abstracts, and optionally a PDF of the full paper of each oral or poster presentation, or a PDF of the actual presentation or of the poster itself. These must be submitted by October 31 to be included on the conference USB. Following the practice of AEES conferences, these will be available on the internet (see [aees.org.au](http://aees.org.au), under the Downloads tab), on the [asc2016.asia](http://asc2016.asia) web site. If submitted during the conference these will be posted on the internet, but will not be included on the conference USB.

## OPTIONAL TOURS

### Mon 28 - Tue 29 November – Volcanoes and Earthquakes of Western Victoria



Depart Melbourne CBD hotels & travel west over volcanic plains to Bacchus Marsh, then over the Rowsley Fault (the most active fault in Western Victoria) to Ballan & Creswick for morning tea. After viewing the diverse range of volcanoes in this region including the historic Deep Lead gold mining area, we travel south through Ballarat to Colac for lunch. An afternoon drive through the main volcanic belt including the Stony Rises, volcanoes & maars at Camperdown and Terang to Tower Hill, concluding at Warrnambool, the site of Victoria's most damaging two earthquakes in 1903, for dinner and overnight accommodation.

Depart Warrnambool and travel along the Great Ocean Road and witness the rugged splendour of the famous 12 Apostles off the shore of the Port Campbell National Park. These eight massive limestone stacks (five have fallen since their discovery), rise up majestically 45 metres from the Southern Ocean and are surrounded by majestic cliffs. Twelve Apostles walking tour – Visit to Apostle Whey Cheese. Guided tour & lunch at the Otway Ranges Treetop Walk – A 600 metre long 25 metre high elevated tree top walk ascending at a gentle grade through a magnificent stand of cool temperature rainforest featuring Myrtle Beech, Blackwood and Mountain Ash. The pinnacle of the treetop walk is the 47 metre high lookout which is ascended via a spiral stairway through the understorey to emerge amongst the crowns of the giants of the forest. Drive along the spectacular Great Ocean Road through Lorne and Anglesea to Geelong, passing over the Lovely Banks Fault, and return to Melbourne CBD hotels. This tour includes bus transfers, a guided tour of the Otway Fly, lunches, the walking tour of the 12 Apostles, dinner and overnight accommodation and breakfast in Warrnambool. It will depart on Monday 28 November at 8am and return to Melbourne on Tuesday 29 November at 5pm. Cost: \$370 per person. Partners/Family very welcome.

## Mon 28 & Tue 29 November – Visit Australia’s earthquake prone region east of Melbourne



Depart Melbourne CBD hotels – Morning Tea at San Remo – Tour of Antarctic Journey – Lunch in Cowes – Churchill Island Tour – Visit to Koala Sanctuary – Dinner & overnight accommodation on Phillip Island – Penguin Tour – Breakfast – Nobbies Board Walk & Seal Cruise – Lunch – return to Melbourne. The route passes over some of the major faults of the Strzelecki Ranges, the most active earthquake region in Australia during the current tectonic stress setting. Join us as we explore the areas of Gippsland and Phillip Island. Be engaged by a hands-on interactive experience at Antarctic Journey. Visit Churchill Island Heritage Farm which holds an important place in the history of European settlement in Victoria and provides a glimpse into the past lives of early Australian settlers and past farming practices. The site of the first European agricultural pursuits in Victoria, the island has been farmed since the 1850's. The tiny island farm of 57 hectares boasts significant natural and cultural values with world-class wetlands, ancient Moonah trees, heritage gardens and historic buildings. This tour also gives you the opportunity to get up close to our native Koalas in their natural bush environment. Plus we will stroll along The Nobbies boardwalk, view the amazing blowhole, a spectacular sea cave that thunders during big southern swells, and enjoy spectacular views along the Island's rugged south coast. This tour includes bus transfers, overnight accommodation, and breakfast. Cost: \$490 per person. Partners/Family very welcome.

## TRAVEL

### By Air

If joining us from interstate or overseas, fly into Tullamarine or Avalon airport (Jetstar flies to both Tullamarine and Avalon). Travel time from Tullamarine airport to Melbourne CBD is approximately 30 minutes and from Avalon airport approximately 50 minutes. An airport shuttle service operates from both airports.

### By Hire Car from Tullamarine Airport

There are five onsite rental companies (Avis, Budget, Europcar, Hertz, Thrifty & Redspot) who all have information desks in the Airport's domestic terminals and offices located on the ground floor of the carpark. If arriving from overseas, an international driver's licence will be required.

### By Public transport from Tullamarine Airport

Skybus offers transport to/from Melbourne CBD and operates 24/7, running every 10 minutes. Cost is \$19 per adult one way or \$38 round trip. Children are cheaper. Tickets can be purchased on arrival at the bus stop or online at [www.skybus.com.au/fares](http://www.skybus.com.au/fares). On arrival at Southern Cross Station in the CBD, SkyBus provides a complimentary hotel transfer service during 6am-10.30pm Monday to Friday and between 7am and 7pm on Saturday and Sunday.

### By Taxi from Tullamarine Airport

Taxi ranks are located on the ground floor outside Terminals 1 and between Terminal 2 and 3. They are also located on the ground floor of the transport hub outside Terminal 4. Fares are based on distance, location and time of travel but from the airport to Melbourne CBD should cost between \$55 and \$65.

### Transport from Avalon Airport

Avalon Airport is located off the Princes Highway (M1) approximately 50 minutes from Melbourne CBD. Car rentals are available from Avalon airport. Taxi fare from Avalon to Melbourne will be between \$100 - \$130. Sita Coaches operate an airport bus service between Avalon Airport and Southern Cross Station in Melbourne's CBD. Cost is \$22 one way.

The MCEC conference centre is located on the Yarra River in the southwest corner of the Melbourne CBD, within easy walking distance of the Southern Cross railway station, and with easy access by trams.

Demand for hotel rooms in Melbourne in November is extremely high so book early to avoid high rates.
